Dear Friends,

Since 1978, A Safe Place has grown exponentially, expanding our services and helping more people find safety, confidence, understanding and hope. Our achievements have been possible because of you.

Your continued generosity has enabled us to broaden the scope of our housing programs to ensure safe shelter and a dependable community for survivors of domestic abuse and their children. Additionally, we have helped prevent future violence through new community education and outreach initiatives.

The COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 tested our commitment to breaking the cycle of violence and meeting the increasing demand for services, but with your help, we rose to meet the challenges.

As you will see in the following pages, we present our key accomplishments from both fiscal year 2019 and fiscal year 2020. We are honored to share this report with you and appreciate the role you have played in our success.

A highlight of 2019 was our collaboration with the Partnership for a Safer Lake County to raise public awareness of hate crimes against women, the LGBTQ community and minorities and garner support from schools, municipalities, law enforcement and other organizations to create a welcoming community.

After many notable achievements in 2019, we faced challenges, but also opportunities in 2020. At the start of the pandemic, victims were isolated at home for extended periods and we anticipated a surge in domestic violence and trafficking. Sadly, our prediction came true. Already in stressful situations with short-tempered abusers, and combined with stretched finances, layoffs, and the health crisis itself, the number of victims reaching out to A Safe Place rose.

At one point, calls to our crisis hotline increased 635% compared to the previous six-month period and we were serving nearly four times more people through our shelter program. As an essential organization, A Safe Place remained fully operational during the pandemic when many other organizations suspended services.

None of our achievements would be possible without our extensive community of supporters. We are grateful to our generous donors who provide vital contributions of funds and resources. Also, we appreciate the many collaborations with our partners in the nonprofit community, the wise guidance from our board of directors and the selfless donations of time and talents by volunteers.

And we are truly thankful for the men, women and children we serve who inspire us every day to remain focused on transforming lives after abuse.

# 2019

**31,345 INDIVIDUALS** received critical services, such as shelter and family visitations, from A Safe Place.

**26,736 NIGHTS** of scattered site transitional housing were provided to 34 adults and 40 children.

**19,635 HOURS** of healing therapy and counseling were provided to 1,238 adult survivors and child witnesses of domestic violence through our behavioral health program.

**3 YEAR** accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) acknowledges our administrative practices and service provision are in line with best practices.

**30 ORGANIZATIONS** engaged in partnerships with A Safe Place, including the Arab American Family Services, Catholic Charities, Jewish Child and Family Services, Lake County State's Attorney's Office, Noah's Rest, Rosalind Franklin University Health Centers and others.

**220 VOLUNTEERS** answered crisis line calls, filed paperwork needed to obtain orders of protection, read stories to children in our housing programs, planned fundraising events, sorted and distributed in-kind donations and more.

## HIGHLIGHTS

# 2020

**32,912 LIVES** were touched and affected through information and services, such as crisis intervention, shelter, individual and group counseling and legal advocacy.

**407 ADULTS & CHILDREN** were provided with emergency shelter at A Safe Place's facility and hotels due to an increase in shelter requests and pandemic considerations. This is a 104% increase over last year.

**50-70 PEOPLE** on average, each week were being sheltered at the height of the pandemic, double the number we sheltered pre-pandemic.

**103 PEOPLE** were sheltered in July (peak of the pandemic locally) versus 23 who received shelter in March (beginning of the pandemic).

**88% INCREASE** in call volume to our crisis hotline, compared to 2019. Bilingual staff and trained volunteers responded to calls, offering supportive listening, information, referrals and safety planning.

**897 ADULT SURVIVORS & 395 CHILD WITNESSES** of domestic violence, a 4% increase over the previous year, received counseling services.

# OUR IMPACT

Although one in three women and one in seven men will experience domestic violence at some point in their lifetime, most cases are never reported to the police. Furthermore, every year, more than 3 million children witness this violence in their homes. Adults and children who live with domestic violence are often isolated by their abuser and do not know where to seek assistance. Despite this horrible reality, there is hope for happiness after abuse.

A Safe Place helps victims to heal through programs and services that are evidence-based, client-centered and built on trauma informed care.

## CRISIS LINE



We operate a free, confidential help line 24 hours a day, seven days a week to assist victims and concerned friends and family members. Bilingual staff and trained volunteers provide supportive listening, information, referrals and safety planning. **In 2020, we helped 3,074 callers, a significant increase over 2019 when we answered calls from 1,636 people.**

## CRISIS RESPONSE SERVICES



Our crisis responders offer safety planning, counseling, referrals and help with obtaining orders of protection to victims wherever they are immediately following a violent incident. Responders also help victims safely exit human trafficking situations. **In 2019, 194 people were helped through our crisis interventions services and in 2020, 255 survivors relied on the trauma-informed advocates.**

## COUNSELING



Individual, group and family counseling, support groups, art therapy and supportive services are available to adults and children. We help individuals understand trauma, process emotions, build self-esteem, develop healthy coping strategies and so much more. **In 2019, therapy and counseling were provided to 851 adults and 387 children, and in 2020, these services were provided to 897 adults and 395 children, often through telehealth.**

## ABUSER INTERVENTION



A Safe Place is one of the few organizations in Illinois providing services to both male and female perpetrators of abuse. Our program addresses accountability, responsibility and alternatives to the cycle of power and control that is central to abusive relationships. **In 2019, 79 perpetrators benefited from 1,109 hours of assessment and counseling, and in 2020, we worked with 55 individuals for over 1,000 hours.**

## LEGAL ADVOCACY



At the Lake County Courthouse, we assist victims with filing orders of protection and navigating the legal system. In addition to providing support with paperwork and referrals, we accompany survivors in court and encourage those who testify against their abuser. **During FY19, we helped 2,217 victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking file orders of protection, and in FY20, 2,179 victims relied on our legal advocacy program.**

## OUR IMPACT



### FAMILY VISITATION CENTER

Services offered at the Family Visitation Center are designed to foster safe, nurturing, and lasting relationships between parents and their children in partnership with court orders. This is achieved through supervised visitations and monitored child custody exchanges. **In 2019, we oversaw 725 supervised visitations and 929 custody exchanges for 77 families with 122 children. In 2020, we provided 747 supervised visitations and 974 custody exchanges for 186 parents with 135 children.**



### COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND PREVENTION EDUCATION

Our educators collaborate with groups, such as first responders, schools and community members, to raise awareness of domestic violence and human trafficking, and educate people about the importance of prevention and available resources for victims. **In 2019, we delivered 846 presentations to 26,318 individuals, and in 2020, we conducted 424 presentations to 10,315 individuals.**



### HOUSING

Removing victims from their abusive environment is a critical step toward safety, stability and security. A Safe Place offers several housing options, all of which include additional supportive services, such as counseling, case management and life skills workshops.

- The 33-bed **emergency shelter** is available to those in immediate danger and fleeing their homes. While sheltered at an undisclosed location, families receive food, clothing and other basic needs.
- Our **transitional living program** and **permanent supportive housing** are available in a 40-unit apartment building where residents benefit from on-site supportive services, basic necessities and other resources to help them rebuild their lives.
- Throughout Lake County, we offer **scattered-site housing**, a safe environment that fosters independent living and self-sufficiency.
- New in FY20, our **rapid rehousing program** accommodates 12 families, providing them with up to nine months of rental assistance, security deposits and supportive services. The program helps members of these households maintain their permanent housing.
- Also new in FY20, we offer 50 beds through our **emergency transitional housing**, which provides temporary transitional housing, food and supportive services to help clients as they prepare for a more stable living situation.

**In FY19, we sheltered 200 individuals (emergency shelter); 77 individuals (scattered site transitional housing); 115 people (permanent supportive housing).**

**In FY20, we sheltered 407 individuals (emergency shelter); 87 individuals (scattered site transitional housing); 73 people (permanent supportive housing).**

# KRYSTAL'S STORY OF HOPE

After nearly 15 years in a physically and emotionally abusive relationship, Krystal found the strength and courage to leave. She suffered multiple black eyes, bruises hidden beneath her clothes and a broken ankle at the hands of someone she had once loved. Or thought she loved.

Krystal and her youngest child had moved across state lines to live with this man, and gradually she recognized the dangerous control he had over her. With few friends and no family in the area, she sought to find connections outside their home; however, his disapproval increased with any signs of her self-sufficiency.

When she asked for money to cover field trip fees for her son, he became irate. A seemingly small request, but one that would result in a broken tooth, which became impacted in the side of her cheek and caused overwhelming pain. She knew she had to leave.

In January of 2019, after her partner left for work, Krystal packed the essentials into bags and met her son at the school bus. They stayed in hiding for nearly three weeks with a friend, and while there, Krystal contacted a national domestic violence hotline, which referred her to A Safe Place for local help.

With guidance from the team at A Safe Place, Krystal and her son moved into one of our transitional apartments and received much needed support. Shortly after moving in, she found herself leaving an office where she applied for food stamps, and all of her trauma came flooding in. Krystal was concerned about the safety and future of herself and her children. She knew in order to improve their situation, she needed to get her GED.

She studied hard for and passed the test, and was then awarded a scholarship to pursue her certified nursing assistant (CNA) certification. A recent graduate from that program, Krystal now has her sights set on becoming a registered nurse (RN). Today, she and her son have an apartment through our permanent supportive housing program, and they continue to thrive.

Since leaving her abuser, Krystal has reconnected with family members who she had been isolated from for years. Through support and counseling at A Safe Place, Krystal has been able to recognize the problems of her past relationships and relearn how to form healthy connections.

Her smile widens when she talks about her six children and two rambunctious grandchildren. She beams with pride over her youngest son's academic successes and knows their future is bright.

"A Safe Place has been a Godsend for me and my family, and I trust their team with my life," she said. "They have been by my side, offering guidance, information and support, with every step on my journey toward healing."

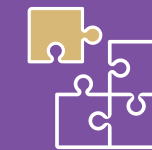

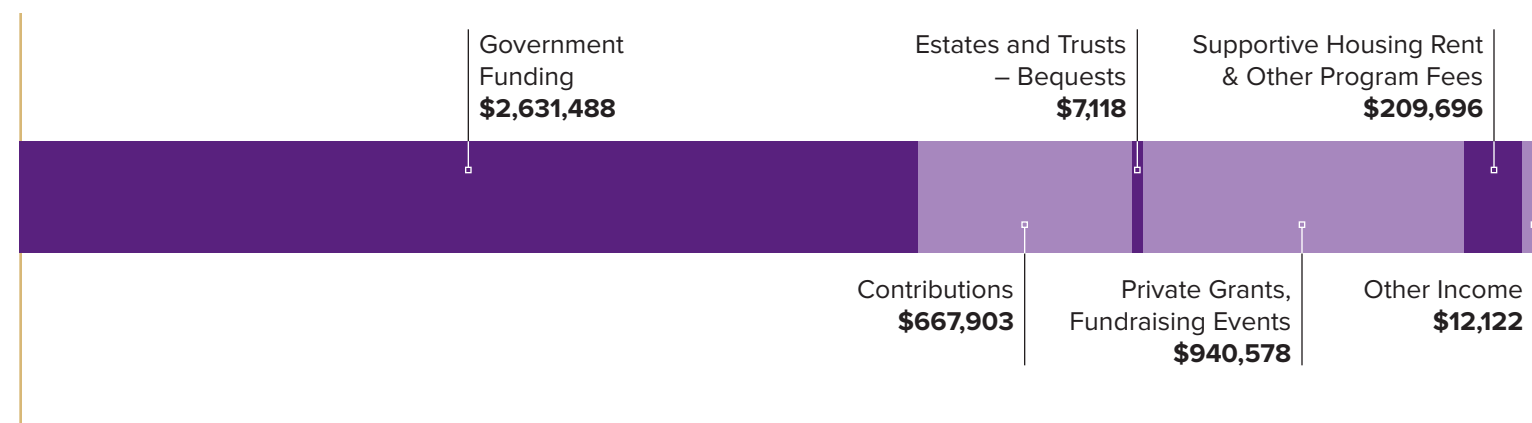

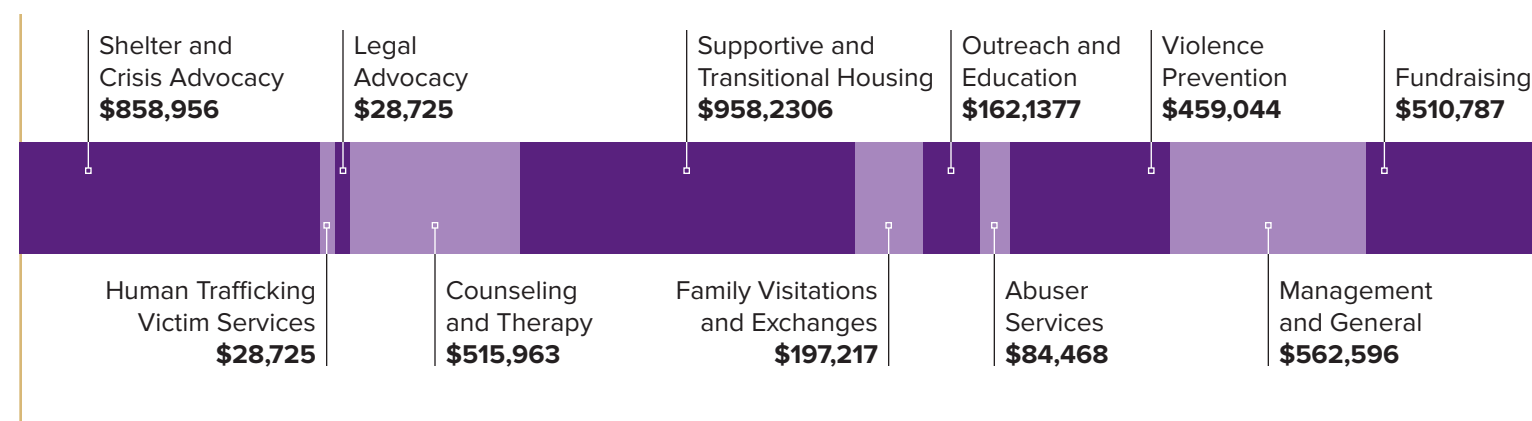

## TOTAL EXPENSES: \$4,521,266



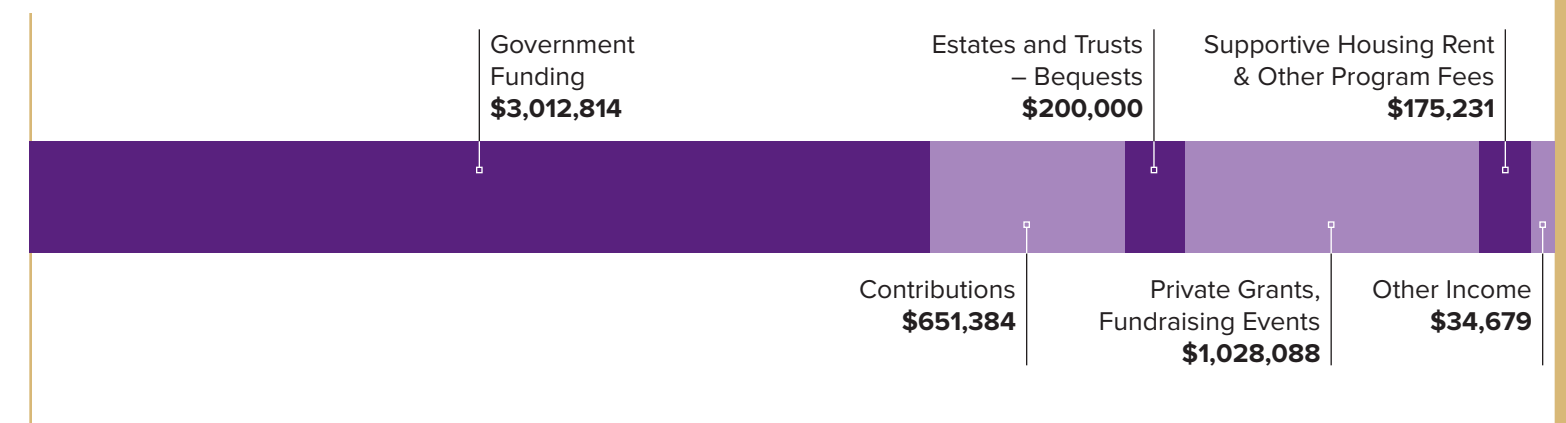

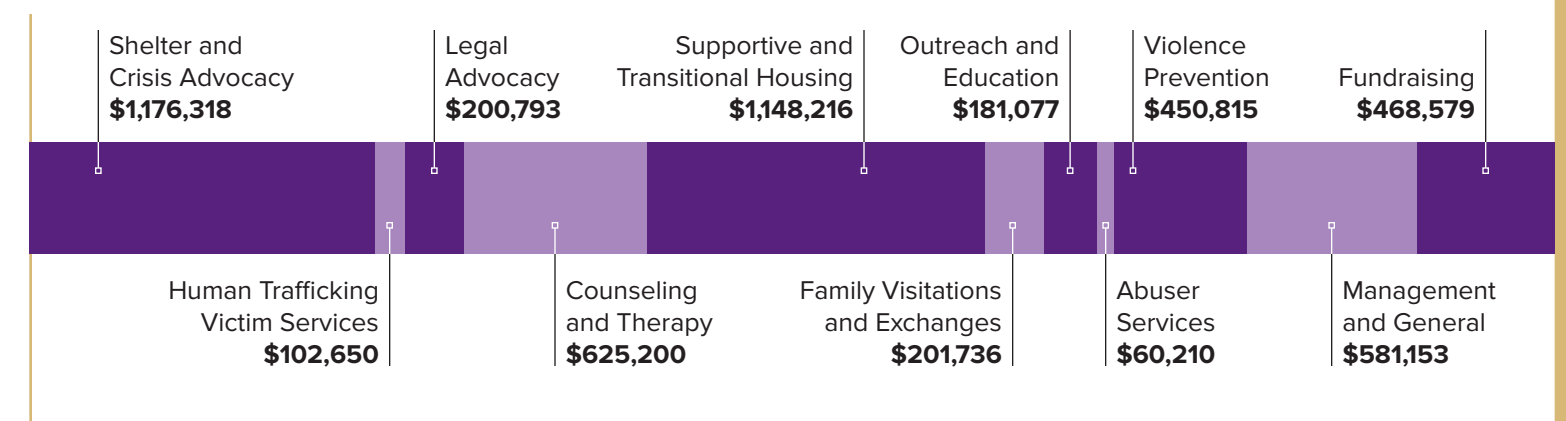
